Agency looks after cats

WOODBURY — Meow Inc., a small organization with a tiny shelter in Litchfield that's filled to capacity, has taken the initiative to help find homes for the two dozen remaining cats still waiting in their cages at Just Cats, the Woodbury cat shelter that is under an eviction order.

Meow, which stands for Make Each Orphan Wanted, has found new shelter for eight cats so far and made contacts for another half-dozen. Meow brought three of the cats to its own shelter, and as each is adopted, another will take its place.

She succeeded in bringing two cats to the New Street Animal Hospital in Danbury, where Dr. Cary Brenner will provide foster homes for them. Dr. Raymond Maizel of Candlewood Animal Hospital has promised to take another one or two. So will Dr. Steven Price of Watertown Animal Hospital and a couple more have already gone to New Milford Animal Welfare, awaiting adoption.
